Present at the meeting called at 1:00 p.m. at the place above designated were: Charlie Pitigliano, presiding, Pat Nunes, Robert Clark, Chuck Mayer, Stan Creelman at 1:04 p.m., and Robert Uchita at 1:10 p.m. Also present at the Board Meeting were John Avila, District Manager, and Chad M. Lew, counsel for the District.

Agenda Item No. 1: Citizen Comments.

Charlie Pitigliano opened the floor to citizen comments, but there were no comments from the public.

Agenda Item No. 2: Review Minutes of May 14, 2019 Board of Trustees Meeting. The minutes of the meeting held on May 14, 2019, were presented to the board in writing and reviewed. Upon a motion made by Robert Clark, seconded by, Chuck Mayer, and unanimously carried, the minutes of the meeting held on May 14, 2019, were approved as presented.

Agenda Item No. 3: Additions / Approval of Agenda. There were no additions to the agenda.

Agenda Item No. 4: Payment of Check Number 5767 - 5808, Electronic Fund Transfers (EFTPS) from Union Bank to the IRS for Social Security, Medicare and Federal Tax Payments, and Union Bank Charges and Credits.

The board members reviewed the District's Union Bank checking account, check numbers 5767 - 5808, the electronic fund transfers (EFTPS) for payment of Social Security, Medicare and Federal Tax Payments to the IRS, and the electronic debit payments from the District's Union Bank account. After some discussion, upon a motion duly made by Chuck Mayer, seconded by Stan Creelman, and unanimously carried, the board approved and accepted as presented Change #26 to the Policy Manual which created the new position of Mechanic/Field Technician for the District.

Agenda Item No. 6: City of Visalia's Storage of Old Trash Bins.

John advised the board that it was discovered that the City of Visalia was storing numbers of old trash bins at a yard within the boundaries of the District which could pose a serious issue if water is allowed to collect therein a large breeding source. John has had discussions with Jim Ross, at City of Visalia, Public Works, and advised him that the cans needed to be cleaned up. Connie:

As you are aware there have been several complaints from residents at the MHP about having numerous mosquitoes around their homes. We have also been having an extraordinary amount of calls from residents in the neighborhood that borders the southern side of the Park.

After setting traps in and around the Park and a thorough check of all possible sources it has become apparent the source of our problem is the ponding basin at the southwest corner. We have treated this in past years however now due to the growth of trees all along the east and west banks of the pond it has become impossible to treat it with any effectiveness. The presence of these trees and their foliage prevent materials from reaching the water from above.

Our efforts to control mosquitoes focuses on treating stagnant water with biological materials which contain little-to-no toxicities to humans and animals. The mosquito larva will ingest these materials while in the water and afterwards will fail to complete their life cycle. Using these integrated pest management techniques enable us to focus our efforts on controlling mosquitoes while they're still larva in the water, otherwise mosquitoes hatch off in exponential numbers and are difficult and expensive to control from that point.

This situation is a very important health concern to our District and constituents. West Nile Virus has been established in our area since 2004. Birds are carrying this virus and mosquitoes are a prime vector in spreading it to humans. A mosquito will bite an infected bird then bite a human in order to transmit the disease. People with suppressed immune systems are very susceptible to the virus, the elderly are especially vulnerable.

It is my recommendation that management do what they can to eliminate the trees, particularly along the west bank. This would enable our technicians to treat across the pond and effectively reach all areas of water. Elimination of ALL tree growth would be the optimal solution though.

Did you know that patios and yards are the #1 source of mosquito problems? There are things that you can do to protect yourself, your neighbors and our park. The first is to remove all sources of standing water. Dispose of old containers not in use. Chlorinate all fountains. Don't let mosquitoes take over your area. You can do your part by hunting down these common sources at least once a week during the spring, summer and early fall. Other interesting facts, I learned are...

- All mosquitoes need standing water to complete their life cycle.
- · Only female mosquitoes bite. They bite to receive protein to produce eggs.
- The life cycle of a mosquito is only 7 days.
- · Each Egg raft they lay on standing water can contain up to 250 eggs.
- They can lay their eggs in containers as small as a bottle cap!

If you can't make this meeting, you are welcome to contact **TMAD** at **686-6628**. They are willing to do "one on one" visits to share the information and inspect your area.



Employers must provide sexual harassment prevention training to all employees by Jan. 1, 2020

Then-Gov. Jerry Brown last September signed a bill requiring California employers of five or more employees to provide expanded training on sexual harassment prevention to all of their employees by Jan. 1, 2020. Practically speaking, this means employers will need to complete the mandatory one- or two-hour trainings for employees in 2019 to be compliant by the January 2020 deadline.

Crafted in response to renewed attention on sexual harassment in the workplace, brought on in part by the #MeToo movement that gained national traction in fall 2017, the new law is a dramatic shift from current requirements that have been in place for more than a decade. The Legislature concluded



that millions of employees in the state may not be aware of their rights and responsibilities under California anti-harassment laws or trained on how to detect and report inappropriate behaviors. The new sexual harassment prevention training requirement impacts the majority of businesses in the state and all of their employees and managers.

Main points for employers

- Employers with at least five employees, in order to comply with the new requirements, must provide by Dec. 31, 2019: (1) at least two hours of sexual harassment prevention training to all managerial employees and (2) at least one hour of sexual harassment prevention training to all nonmanagerial employees.
- After the 2019 compliance requirements are met, employers must provide training every two years at minimum.
- Training must occur within six months of hire to a nonmanagerial position or promotion to a managerial position (including hiring) as applicable.
- Newly created businesses with five or more employees or contractors must provide training within six months of the business' establishment and then every two years thereafter.
- Part-time, temporary and independent contractors must be included toward the minimum count of five employees.
- The training may be conducted as a group presentation or on an individual basis and may be broken into shorter time segments as long as the two-hour requirement for managerial employees and one-hour requirement for nonmanagerial employees are met.
- Employees hired after Jan. 1, 2020, who received training by a previous employer need only be required to read and acknowledge receipt of the employer's anti-harassment policy within six months of assuming the new position. The burden of establishing that the prior training was legally compliant with this section is on the current employer.

Training for seasonal and temporary employees

Also by the January 2020 deadline, employers must provide training to temporary and seasonal employees, as well as any employee who is hired to work for less than six months. The training must occur within 30 calendar days after the hire date or within 100 hours worked, whichever comes first. In the case of temporary employees employed by an agency (as defined by Lab. Code sec. 2810.3) to perform services for clients, the training must be provided by the agency, not the client.

Training formats

Employers can satisfy this training by offering classroom training, e-learning or webinars as described here.

Classroom training: In-person classroom training that features content created by a trainer. The employees receive the training from a trainer in a setting that is removed from the employees' daily duties. California law in CCR sec. 11024(a)(9) specifically defines the credentials that a qualified trainer must possess.

E-learning: Individualized, interactive and computer-based training that was created by a trainer and an instructional designer. Employees must have the opportunity to ask a trainer questions and receive a response within two business days.

Webinar: An internet-based seminar that features content created and taught by a trainer and that is transmitted over the internet in real time. Employers who use a webinar for training must document that each employee who is not physically present in the same room as the trainer attended the training. They must also document that the employee actively participated in the training's interactive content, discussion questions, hypothetical scenarios, polls, quizzes or tests and activities. Webinars must provide employees with the opportunity to ask questions and receive answers to those questions or otherwise seek guidance and assistance.

The regulations also authorize other effective, interactive training — including audio, video or other computer technology — but only if used along with, and as a supplement to, classroom, webinar or e-learning training.

Record-keeping requirements

To track compliance, employers must keep documentation for a minimum of two years and be able to provide copies upon request.

The training record must include all of the following minimum information:

- The name of the supervisor who received training
- The training type and date
- The attendance sign-in sheet
- A copy of all certificates of attendance or completion issued
- A copy of all written or recorded materials that comprise the training
- The training provider's name

In addition to the above, specific documentation requirements for both trainers and employers are mandated for e-learning and webinar training:

- E-learning: The trainer must maintain all written questions received and all written responses or guidance provided for a period of two years after the date of the response.
- Webinars: The employer must maintain a copy of the webinar, all written materials used by the trainer and all written questions submitted during the webinar. The employer must also document all written responses or guidance the trainer provided during the webinar.

Government obligations

The Department of Fair Employment and Housing must develop or obtain two online training courses on the prevention of sexual harassment in the workplace in accordance with the provisions of the law. Both courses must contain an interactive component that requires viewers to periodically answer questions in order for the course to continue to play. The DFEH published a new online resources webpage for California employers and expects to have such trainings available by late 2019.

Preparation and planning

Employers with five or more employees should check their calendars and determine when they can train their employees in 2019 in order to be compliant with the law by the Jan. 1, 2020, deadline.

Employers might begin by researching third-party companies that are qualified to conduct training under DFEH regulations for either in-person or online training. Before deciding to utilize a company, the employer should verify that its training meets the requirements outlined above.

Directing employees to online training courses hosted by DFEH is another way employers can satisfy their harassment prevention training obligations. Regardless, the unavailability of a specific training should not preclude employers from satisfying the requirement sooner rather than later.

Developing a written harassment, discrimination and retaliation prevention policy that reflects current law is a requirement under California law. A policy can be found in CDA Practice Support's "Sample Employee Manual" template:

West Nile Virus, 20 Years Later

In late summer 1999, the first domestically acquired human cases of West Nile virus were documented in the U.S., all within the state of New York. That year, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported 62 cases and seven deaths. This outbreak represented the first time this virus has been detected in the Western Hemisphere and marked the first time that this Old World virus, first characterized in detail during several outbreaks in the Mediterranean basin in the early 1950s and 1960s, had been identified outside of the Eastern Hemisphere.1

By the end of the 2001, the CDC reported West Nile virus activity detected for the first time in southern states including Florida, Georgia and Louisiana. The following year, a large, multi-state, epidemic of neuroinvasive West Nile illness occurred as activity expanded across the midsection of U.S. to the Pacific Coast. In all, 39 states and the District of Columbia reported 4,156 human West Nile virus illness cases in 2002.2

Now, 20 years after the emergence of West Nile virus in the U.S., the disease continues to take its toll.

WEST NILE VIRUS TODAY

Today, West Nile virus has become endemic in the U.S. with detection in all 50 states, Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia.

Following the initial detection of West Nile virus in the U.S., the CDC developed a national electronic surveillance system for arboviral diseases, ArboNET, in 2000. Through ArboNET, the CDC monitors epidemiology, incidence, and geographic spread of West Nile virus and other arboviruses, providing timely information to public health officials, government leaders, researchers, clinicians, and the public.

Health care providers, veterinarians, and commercial labs report data to their state or local health departments and these health

departments upload data to ArboNET on a weekly basis. The CDC then analyzes and publicly disseminates this information.


During 1999-2018, more than 50,000 West Nile virus disease cases were reported to the CDC through ArboNET, including more than 24,000 cases of neuroinvasive disease and more than 2,200 deaths.2,3


ADDRESSING WEST NILE VIRUS


While detected in several species of mosquitoes, the main vectors of West Nile virus in the U.S. are Culex pipiens (complex) and Culex tarsalis mosquitoes due to their seasonal abundance, vector competence and high field infection rates. These species breed in stagnant water that has a heavy organic content. In urban areas, catch basins, poorly draining ditches and waterfilled artificial containers (such as used tires) are common production sites for Culex mosquitoes.4

Culex feed on a wide variety of vertebrate host species and the variation in their feeding preference often drive intensity and timing of West Nile virus infection.

Field studies suggest that West Nile virus transmission is influenced strongly by a few key super spreader bird species that function both as primary blood hosts of the vector mosquitoes and as reservoircompetent virus hosts.








WEST NILE VIRUS, 20 YEARS LATER |

To combat the spread of West Nile virus in the U.S., public health officials, often local governments and mosquito abatement districts, have utilized an integrated vector management (IVM) approach.5 IVM approaches are based on an understanding of mosquito biology, the



mosquito life cycle, and the way mosquitoes spread viruses to develop plans for controlling mosquito populations. Key activities include surveillance to monitor mosquito populations, utilization of insecticides to control larvae and adult mosquitoes, and regular evaluation of the efficacy of these efforts.

Surveillance programs use extensive mosquito traps to monitor mosquito populations and detect West Nile virus. These programs also frequently test species of dead birds which are very susceptible to West Nile virus - affected birds will die quickly after infection and are good early indicators of the location and timing of disease activity. Where dead birds are less likely to be seen, programs may utilize sentinel chickens to serve as an early indicator of disease.

West Nile virus is established as a seasonal epidemic that flares up in the summer and continues into the fall making early season control efforts extremely important to reduce the population buildup. The most effective method of mosquito control is larviciding to

treat locations where mosquito larvae are present, such as water impounded in the bottom of catch basins (storm drains).

Public health officials also control adult mosquitoes using pyrethroidand organophosphate-based pesticides. However, aerosol fog kills only mosquitoes that contact insecticide droplets, and the fog soon dissipates. Although the local mosquito population is reduced, fogging does not prevent mosquitoes from re-entering the area. Because only a part of the local adult mosquito population is reduced for a few days by fogging, municipalities should give priority to larval mosquito control of Culex mosquitoes. Nonetheless, when the risk of human disease is present, the only method that will reduce the population of West Nile virus-infected mosquitoes throughout a community is adulticiding. It should be noted that resistance to pyrethroid insecticides in Culex pipiens and Culex tarsalis has been increasingly reported in recent years and is an important and growing concern for public health officials.

TOWARD THE FUTURE

In 2005, the U.S. Department of Agriculture licensed a DNA vaccine to prevent West Nile virus in horses, but currently, there is no licensed West Nile virus vaccine for humans. Federal regulations for veterinary products are less stringent than those intended for human use and products developed for animals can proceed at a faster pace.6

Challenges persist, including insecticide resistance and the need for adequate public funding to support public health officials as they work to control the spread of disease and educate the population on steps to protect against transmission and help reduce mosquito breeding sources.

Local governments and mosquito abatement districts in the U.S. continue to the be front line of defense against West Nile virus. Because of their dedicated efforts, reported cases of West Nile virus have fallen from a peak of nearly 10,000 in 2003 to approximately 2,500 in 2018.

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
